Enedelia has been an AARP volunteer in Austin for nearly a decade. With extensive experience at both the state level and within local chapters, she focuses on initiatives that uplift communities often overlooked in policymaking, especially communities of color in Texas.

Growing up in a family of migrant farm workers, Enedelia was the first in her extended family to attend university and earn a degree. Inspired by her mother, she pursued higher education and paved the way for her sister to do the same. Her mother's encouragement to "get educated, follow your dreams, and go where you need to go" has been a driving force in her advocacy work. Obregon's mission is to be a voice for those who lack the means or resources to advocate for themselves.

Enedelia often cites the Jewish saying by Rabbi Tarfon, "You are not obligated to complete the work, but neither are you free to desist from it," as a reminder of her commitment to volunteer work. She believes that everyone can contribute to promoting a better standard of living for retirees and their families. Her dedication is evident in her actions and the impact she has on her community.

During the ice freeze in February 2023, Enedelia experienced firsthand the power of community support when a neighbor brought her family coffee every morning while they were without power. Similarly, after breaking her elbow, another neighbor with four young children offered to take her to physical therapy. These acts of kindness reinforce the AARP message: "With AARP, you don't have to be a member, but being a member means watching out for others." Obregon embodies this spirit by serving her community through advocacy and legislative efforts, always prioritizing the well-being of others.

Enedelia's story is a testament to the difference one person can make. Her ongoing efforts remind us of all of the importance of community, compassion, and the responsibility we share to help one another.

# Upcoming Speakers for the Next Few Months



### July 16th, 2024:

The "Healthy Living for Your Brain and Body" program, presented by Faith Lane of the Alzheimer's Association Capital of Texas Chapter, focuses on the connection between brain and body health, highlighting lifestyle choices that can promote healthy aging. The program is based on current research and aims to provide practical tips for maintaining cognitive health

### August 20, 2024:

The Red Line Parkway Initiative aims to create a welcoming, car-free parkway that connects communities from Downtown Austin to Cedar Park to Leander. This 32-mile linear park will provide a safe space for biking and walking, enhancing travel to area destinations and public spaces. The initiative focuses on planning, funding, building, and activating this parkway, with segments already completed and more in the design phase. The project seeks to unite local, state, and federal support along with private donations to fully realize this vision by the end of the decade.

### **September 17, 2024**

The AARP HomeFit program, presented by AARP, provides valuable guidance on making homes safer and more comfortable for older adults. The program utilizes the concept of universal design to accommodate people of all abilities and includes both simple modifications and more complex installations to enhance home livability.

### October 15, 2024:

The Austin Wildlife Rescue, presented by Kathryn Mattison, is a nonprofit organization dedicated to rehabilitating and releasing orphaned, injured, and sick wildlife in Central Texas. The organization has been active since 1977 and has helped nearly 10,000 animals. Their goal is to educate the public on how to coexist with native wildlife and provide direct assistance with wildlife issues. The Rescue does not accept exotic pets but focuses on native animals displaced by construction, weather, or human activity.
